Tim Walsh Era Opens on Saturday September 7, 2009 as No. 12/13 Cal Poly Hosts Sacramento State With New Coaching Staff and Revamped Defense, Mustangs (0-0) to Face Hornets (0-1) for First Time Since 2006 Season

With an entirely new coaching staff led by head coach Tim Walsh, a switch from the Double Eagle Flex 3-4 defensive alignment to the more traditional multiple 4-3 formation and the replacement of seven offensive starters, mostly in the skill positions, who helped produce the nation's top Football Championship Subdivision team in both scoring and total offense in 2008, Cal Poly opens its 2009 season Saturday afternoon, hosting Sacramento State (0-1) for a 4:05 p.m. non-conference game in Alex G. Spanos Stadium (11,075).

Saturday's game will be broadcast live on ESPN Radio 1280 with Tom Barket providing the play-by-play and Joe Harper doing the color commentary. Audio and video streams of the contest will be available on www.GoPoly.com. A new scoreboard/video board also will be unveiled. Albert and Patty Moriarty made a substantial naming gift of \$600,000 for the project.

The season opener for the Mustangs also is their Hall of Fame Game with wrestlers Chuck Liddell and John Woods, administrator/coach Evelyn Pellaton and benefactor Alex G. Spanos to be honored at halftime.

The new-look Mustangs, ranked 12th and 13th this week, completed a three-week preseason camp last week while the Hornets opened their campaign with a 38-3 setback at UNLV.

Walsh was hired last January to replace Rich Ellerson, who left after eight seasons at the Mustang helm to head the football program at Army. Walsh accumulated a 117-82 record in 18 seasons as head coach -- four at Sonoma State and 14 at Portland State -- before spending the last two years as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Army.

Cal Poly has enjoyed great success on the football field in recent years -- six consecutive winning seasons, three Great West Conference titles in the last five years and NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoff berths in both 2005 and 2008.

Junior Tony Smith is expected to make his first start at quarterback for Cal Poly. There will be new personnel at wide

receiver and one of the two slotback positions, but the other slotback will be converted fullback Jon Hall, making room for Jordan Yocum at fullback. Hall, Yocum and slotback Jono Grayson all rushed for about 350 yards a year ago.

Only one of this year's crop of wide receivers has made a catch at Cal Poly -- Eric Gardley with one in 2007 before he played in the defensive secondary in 2008. Other pass catching candidates are Mike Anderson, Jarred Houston and Dominique Johnson, a transfer from UCLA.

Offensive linemen Maurice McClure, Will Mitchell, Art Munoz and Jason Cox all started at least four games a year ago. Cox is still recovering from offseason knee surgery and will be replaced by Hal Kelley at center.

The Mustang defense features eight returning starters: Ryan Shotwell at end, James Chen at tackle, Marty Mohamed and Carlton Gillespie at linebacker, David Fullerton and Greg Francis at safety and Asa Jackson and Xavier Gardner at cornerback.

Sacramento State, coached by Marshall Sperbeck (third season, 9-15, Nevada '84), returns 33 lettermen, including 11 starters, off last year's team which went 6-6 and finished tied for sixth place in the Big Sky at 3-5.

In the loss to UNLV on Saturday, Terrance Dailey, a transfer from Washington, rushed for 101 yards on 19 carries while quarterback Jason Smith, starting for the third straight year, completed eight of 17 passes for 85 yards with one interception. Evander Wilkins rushed for 43 yards on 12 trips and caught a team-leading three passes for 23 yards. Chris Diniz hit his only field goal attempt, a 44-yarder, as time ran out in the first half, for the only Hornet points of the game. Safeties Deionte Gordon and Zach Schrader each had 13 tackles.

Sacramento State opened on the road for the seventh time in the last eight years and is 0-7 during that run on the road, all against Football Bowl Subdivision teams. The Hornets beat Division II Humboldt State at home a year ago.

The Mustangs and Hornets are meeting for the first time since 2006 when Cal Poly beat Sacramento State for the fourth straight time, 17-13, at Hornet Stadium. The two teams are meeting for the 31st time and the series is all even at 15-15 -- 8-8 in San Luis Obispo and 7-7 in Sacramento.

The Mustangs have won 48 of their last 69 games dating back to the 2002 season finale and have won 18 of their last 30 games on the road and 30 of their last 36 home contests. Cal Poly has won seven or more games each of the last six seasons, the longest such streak in school history, and scored in 41 of 44 quarters last fall. Cal Poly has won four of its last six season openers and is 6-9 in season openers since moving to the Football Championship Subdivision in 1994. The Mustangs are 14-5 in their last 19 games against teams from the Big Sky Conference.

Cal Poly will play a pair of Football Bowl Subdivision teams the next two weeks, visiting Ohio on Sept. 19 and San Jose State on Sept. 26. The Mustangs have won three of their last eight games against FBS schools, defeating UTEP 34-13 in the 2003 opener and San Diego State 16-14 in 2006 and 29-27 in the 2008 opener.

Mustang Notes

PRESEASON HONORS: Three Cal Poly football players were named to preseason All-America teams. Senior safety **David Fullerton** earned a spot on the 2009 Sports Network Preseason Football Championship Subdivision All-America Third Team. **Fullerton** and sophomore cornerback **Asa Jackson** are honorable mentions on the 2009 College Sporting News Preseason FCS All-America Team. Senior linebacker **Carlton Gillespie** is an honorable mention on the Consensus Draft Services 2009 FCS Preseason All-America Team. And 10 Mustangs landed on the 2009 Phil Steele's College Football Preview Preseason All-Great West first or second teams. All four Mustangs on the first unit play on defense -- **Fullerton, Jackson, Gillespie** and junior down lineman **James Chen**. Named to the second team were senior slotback **Jon Hall**, junior offensive guard **Will Mitchell**, junior center **Jason Cox**, senior defensive end **Ryan Shotwell**, junior defensive end **Gavin Cooper** and sophomore safety **Greg Francis**.

FOUR ALL-GREAT WEST HONOREES RETURN: Cal Poly placed 11 players on the 2008 All-Great West Football Conference first and second teams and four of the honorees return this fall. They are linebacker **Carlton Gillespie**, defensive backs **David Fullerton** and **Asa Jackson** and defensive lineman **James Chen**. The seven who have departed are center **Stephen Field**, wide receivers **Ramses Barden** and **Tre'dale Tolver**, quarterback **Jonathan Dally**, defensive lineman **Sean Lawyer**, linebacker **Fred Hives** and running back **James Noble**. **Barden** and **Field** were four-time All-Great West first-team honorees.

MUSTANGS 6-9 IN SEASON OPENERS: Since beginning play in Division I FCS in 1994, Cal Poly has won six of 15 season openers, including four of the last six. A losing streak of five was snapped six years ago at Texas-El Paso, 34-13. The Mustangs beat Humboldt State 42-7 in the 2004 opener, Fort Lewis 44-0 in the 2006 opener and San Diego State 29-27 in the 2008 opener. Cal Poly is 12-3 in regular-season finales over the last 15 years -- Rich Ellerson was 7-1 -- falling 36-35 in overtime to Wisconsin in 2008. Ellerson won five straight home openers prior to a 30-28 loss to Montana in 2008 and was 5-3 in eight seasons.

HOME ATTENDANCE: Cal Poly's average of 9,574 fans for seven home games during the 2008 season was No. 37 among the 118 Football Championship Subdivision schools. Appalachian State led the way with an average of 25,161 for eight home contests, followed by Montana (23,923 for nine home games) and Delaware (21,609 for six home games). Among Great West Conference schools, UC Davis was No. 41 with a 9,016 average while Southern Utah was No. 83 with a 4,885 average. North Dakota (10,167) and South Dakota (7,645) were reclassifying a year ago.

CAL POLY AGAINST THE BIG SKY: Since moving to the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly Division I-AA) in 1994, Cal Poly is 25-32 against teams from the Big Sky Conference, including a 14-5 mark in the last 19 games and 1-2 in 2008. Cal Poly has defeated Montana State (1997, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2003, 2004, 2005) and Sacramento State (1995, 1997, 2001, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2006) seven times each, Idaho State (2004, 2005, 2007, 2008) four times, Weber State (2002, 2006, 2007) three times, Eastern Washington (1995, 2005) twice and Montana (2005) and Northern Colorado (2007) once each. Cal Poly went 2-2 against the Big Sky in 2001 and 1-3 in 2002. The Mustangs played five Big Sky opponents in 2003 and finished 2-3. Cal Poly beat three Big Sky teams in one season for the first time in 2004 and finished 2005 with a 5-1 mark against Big Sky members, best in school history. Cal Poly beat Montana, Montana State and Eastern Washington, the three teams who shared first place with 5-2 marks in 2005. Cal Poly was 2-1 in 2006 and beat Weber State, Northern Colorado and Idaho State in 2007. Rich Ellerson was 19-15 against the Big Sky in eight seasons, including a 14-5 mark over the last five seasons.

ON STAGE: **Stan Sheriff** played in the 1954 East-West Shrine Classic and 51 years passed before a second Mustang was chosen to play in the contest. Linebacker **Jordan Beck** played in the 2005 game at AT&T Park in San Francisco. Just one year later, defensive end **Chris Gocong** became the third Mustang to play in the prestigious game, moved to the AlamoDome in San Antonio, Texas. And linebacker **Kyle Shotwell** made it three in a row, playing in the East-West Shrine Game in 2007 in Houston. Shotwell was the leading tackler in the game with seven and earned the Pat Tillman Award. Wide receiver **Ramses Barden** played in the 2009 Senior Bowl in Mobile, Alabama. Cal Poly offensive lineman **Ben Cobian** played in the 2005 Las Vegas All-American Classic in Sam Boyd Stadium. Cornerback **David Richardson** and punter **Gilbert Rocha** played in the Las Vegas All-American Classic in 2004 while cornerback **Vaughn Jarrett** and tackle **Brett Nichols** played in the 2003 event, then known as the Paradise Bowl, at Dixie College in St. George, Utah.

MUSTANGS PICKED TO REPEAT: Cal Poly was selected by the Great West Conference's five head coaches to repeat as conference champion in 2009. The Mustangs earned four of the five first-place votes and 24 total points. UC Davis garnered the other first-place vote and 20 points for second place, followed by South Dakota, North Dakota and Southern Utah. Cal Poly has won Great West titles in 2004, 2005 and 2008.

GREAT WEST VS. THE REST: Great West Football Conference members were 17-16 last fall against non-conference opponents and 19-16 in 2007. Great West teams were 5-3 against the Big Sky Conference in 2007 and 4-7 in 2008.

Mustang Notes

HORNET NOTES: Sacramento State, coached by Marshall Sperbeck (third season, 9-15, Nevada '84), returns 33 lettermen, including 11 starters, off last year's team which went 6-6 and finished tied for sixth place in the Big Sky at 3-5 ... the Hornets fell 38-3 to UNLV in the 2009 season opener for both schools Saturday night at Sam Boyd Stadium in Las Vegas ... Terrance Dailey, a transfer from Washington, rushed for 101 yards on 19 carries while quarterback Jason Smith, starting for the third year, completed eight of 17 passes for 85 yards with one interception ... Evander Wilkins rushed for 43 yards on 12 trips and caught a team-leading three passes for 23 yards ... Chris Diniz hit his only field goal attempt, a 44-yarder, as time ran out in the first half ... the Hornets accumulated 12 first downs, 129 yards rushing and 99 yards passing for 228 total yards ... the Hornet defense gave up 466 total yards and 21 first downs ... safeties Deionte Gordon and Zach Schrader each had 13 tackles ... Sacramento State opened on the road for the seventh time in the last eight years and is 0-7 during that run, all against Football Bowl Subdivision teams ... the Hornets are 0-10 against FBS schools since elevating their program to Division I in 1993 ... junior defensive tackle Christian Clark was named to the preseason All-Big Sky team and also earned honorable mention All-American honors from College Sporting News ... junior running back Bryan Hilliard, who rushed for 1,082 yard and 12 TDs in 2008, will redshirt the 2009 campaign after undergoing surgery to both shoulders ... Smith has passed for 3,735 yards in two-plus seasons ... the Mustangs and Hornets are meeting for the first time since 2006 when Cal Poly beat Sacramento State for the fourth straight time, 17-13, at Hornet Stadium ... the two teams are meeting for the 31st time and the series is all even at 15-15 ... Sperbeck was head coach at Foothill College for 15 seasons, posting a 109-53 overall record, before taking over at Sacramento State in 2007.

HOME OPENERS: Cal Poly drew a record crowd of 11,075 for its 2007 home opener against Weber State on Sept. 15 in newly renovated Alex G. Spanos Stadium. Prior to that game, the record crowd for a home opener was the 8,007 who showed up for Rich Ellerson's debut as Mustang head coach on Sept. 1, 2001 against Montana. The 2008 home opener against Montana drew 10,035, while the Great West games against South Dakota on Oct. 4 and UC Davis on Nov. 15 attracted the second and third sellouts (11,075) in the renovated facility. With limited seating capacity due to ongoing construction, Cal Poly drew 5,857 for its 2006 home opener against Fort Lewis. The Mustangs attracted 6,786 for the 2005 home opener against Sacramento State, slightly lower than the 6,833 for Humboldt State in 2004. Capacity was lowered to 5,400 for the start of the 2006 campaign, increasing to 11,775 by the finale. A total of 143,094 fans saw Cal Poly in 2005, exceeding the 2003 record total of 109,910. Cal Poly drew 48,222 fans for its five home games in 2007, averaging 9,644.4 fans per game and broke the mark for home attendance last fall with 67,018 fans for seven dates (9,574 average).

PLAYOFFS BY THE DOTS: Last year the Mustangs earned their second NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoff berth, falling to Weber State 49-35 in Alex G. Spanos Stadium ... Cal Poly earned its only other FCS playoff berth in 2005 ... the Mustangs moved to Division I in 1994 ... in 2005 the Mustangs beat Montana 35-21 in the first round before falling to Texas State 14-7 in the quarterfinals ... the Mustangs failed to earn an invitation to the playoffs in 2004 despite their 9-2 record ... the 1997 squad went 10-1 and also failed to make the playoffs ... Richmond beat Montana 24-7 in the 2008 FCS national championship game, ending Appalachian State's three-year reign.

FREQUENT FLYER MILES: Cal Poly played seven games on the road in 2005, accumulating a total of 17,192 miles. The schedule included two trips to Missoula, Mont., and the longest trip was 2,430 miles to Troy, Alabama. Only one of the trips was by bus only -- the game at UC Davis. In 2006, Cal Poly played four California schools -- bus trips to San Jose State, San Diego State and Sacramento State plus the home game against UC Davis -- and made just three trips by plane -- to Weber State, Montana and North Dakota State. The 2007 schedule featured six road games, including plane trips to Texas State, Idaho, South Dakota State and Idaho State, and only one game against a California school -- at UC Davis on Oct. 13. The Mustangs traveled by bus to Southern Utah. Total mileage for the 2007 squad was 11,166 miles. The 2008 Mustangs had just one bus trip -- to San Diego State -- and flew to Northwestern State, South Dakota State and Wisconsin. This fall Cal Poly flies to Ohio, Montana, North Dakota and Weber State.

WORKING OVERTIME: Cal Poly has played five overtime games since the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly Division I-AA) rule was adopted in 1994. The Mustangs are 1-4, including the only overtime game played in Alex G. Spanos Stadium, a triple-OT 29-26 loss to Northern Iowa in 2002. Cal Poly fell 35-32 in one OT at Idaho State on Sept. 7, 1996; beat host New Mexico State in one OT, 38-35, on Oct. 4, 1997; fell 43-40 in four OTs at Weber State on Nov. 3, 2001 and fell 36-35 in one OT at Wisconsin in 2008.

NEW MENTORS: None of Cal Poly's 11 football foes this fall has a first-year head coach. Ed Lamb is in his second season at Southern Utah while Chris Mussman is a second-year head coach at North Dakota.

MUSTANG STADIUM OVERHAUL: Cal Poly held groundbreaking ceremonies for renovation of Mustang Stadium on Sept. 10, 2005, at the Richard J. O'Neill Green. The project, which included an expanded field, press box, donor suites, new lighting, a memorial plaza entrance and upgraded restrooms, has expanded seating capacity to 11,075 fans and cost about \$19.4 million to complete. The name of the facility, originally opened in 1935, is officially Mustang Memorial Field at Alex G. Spanos Stadium.

SIXTEENTH YEAR OF FCS: Cal Poly is entering its 91st season of football since 1915 and the 16th season of playing at the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly Division I-AA) level. The Mustangs played their 100th game as a I-AA member at UTEP on Sept. 6, 2003. The Mustangs, 92-75 as an FCS school, moved to Division I-AA from Division II in 1994 and were members of the now-defunct American West Conference (Southern Utah, Sacramento State, Cal State Northridge), before becoming an independent in 1996. After eight years as an FCS Independent, the Mustangs became a charter member of the Great West Football Conference in 2004. The university is a member of the Big West Conference for all other sports except wrestling (Pac-10 associate member) and women's indoor track (Mountain Pacific Sports Federation).

PLAYERS OF THE WEEK: Wide receiver **Ramses Barden** was Cal Poly's first Great West player of the week for 2008, earning offensive honors for his performance (seven catches, 161 yards, 1 TD) against San Diego State on Aug. 30. Defensive end **Gavin Cooper**, with seven tackles and two sacks, was named Great West defensive player of the week following the Northwestern State contest. The Mustangs swept the three awards after the South Dakota State win Oct. 18. Slot back **Jono Grayson** rushed for 124 yards and two touchdowns to earn offensive honors while end **Ryan Shotwell** secured 3.0 sacks among his six tackles for defensive accolades. Linebacker **Ian Masterson** blocked a Jackrabbit punt and notched an assisted tackle for special teams player of the week. **Barden's** 12 catches for 217 yards and two scores Oct. 25 against Southern Utah was worthy of offensive player of the week honors again. Slotback **Ryan Mole** rushed for 140 yards and scored three touchdowns against Idaho State on Nov. 1 to earn offensive player of the week. **Jonathan Dally** ran for two TDs and passed for two more against North Carolina Central to earn offensive player of the week Nov. 8, then rushed for a career-high 173 yards and a touchdown and passed for 95 yards and two more scores against UC Davis for his fifth career Great West player of the week honor. In the 36-35 overtime loss to Wisconsin on Nov. 22, **Tre'dale Tolver** (special teams) returned a punt 40 yards for a score and cornerback **Asa Jackson** (defense) notched five solo tackles, forced a fumble and broke up three passes.

FAST STARTS: Cal Poly's 5-0 start in 2004 matched the performances of eight other Mustang teams with 5-0 starts or better. The list:

STRETCHING THE TRUTH: Cal Poly's tallest player on the 2009 roster is freshman offensive lineman **Patrick Downey**, 6-6. Shortest are redshirt freshman slotback **Kelvin Rutledge** and senior defensive back **Nick Gancayco**, both at 5-6. Senior wide receiver **Jono Grayson** is 5-7. The lightest are **Rutledge** and **Gancayco** at 165 while the heaviest is offensive lineman **Will Mitchell** at 283. Freshman fullback **Gabriel Umoh** is the youngest Cal Poly player -- he won't turn 18 until Oct. 1. Oldest Mustang is senior safety **David Fullerton**, who turned 23 on Aug. 17, 13 days before junior slotback **Mike Montero**. Senior linebacker **Blaze Silberman** turns 23 on Oct. 18 while junior defensive back **Kellen Moriarty** turns 23 on Dec. 2.

FAKE GRASS: Cal Poly lost 19 consecutive games on artificial turf before snapping the streak with a 34-13 triumph at UTEP on Sept. 6, 2003. Prior to the win at UTEP, Cal Poly's last win on artificial turf was Sept. 22, 1990 at Portland State, 36-23. The Mustangs finished 2-2 on fake grass in 2007 -- beating UC Davis and Idaho State while falling to Texas State and Idaho -- and are 7-29 since that Portland State game in 1990. Cal Poly has won seven of its last 18 games on artificial turf, including the Sept. 13, 2008, win at Northwestern State and the Nov. 22, 2008, overtime loss at Wisconsin. The Mustangs play five games on fake grass this fall -- at Ohio, San Jose State, Montana, North Dakota and UC Davis.

TRIPLE FIGURES: In 2007, six of Cal Poly's 11 foes produced a 100-yard rusher, including a pair of 200-yard games -- Deonte' Jackson (214) of Weber State and Cory Koenig (259) of South Dakota State. In 2002, each of Cal Poly's first eight opponents produced a 100-yard rusher. Nine of the 11 opponents in 2002 had a 100-yard rusher. The Mustangs surrendered over 100 yards to an opposing running back just three times in 2003, only once in 2004 (Sacramento State's Kris Daniels netted 115 yards in the season finale) and four in 2005. Montana's Andrew Schmidt (145 yards), Wisconsin's John Clay (107 yards) and Weber State's Trevyn Smith (137 yards) were the only three to accomplish the feat in 2008.

THE 200 CLUB: James Noble's 221-yard performance against Eastern Washington on Nov. 5, 2005 was the 10th best in Mustang history and marked the 15th time that a Cal Poly running back had surpassed the 200-yard mark. Two weeks later against Idaho State he rushed for 248 yards -- fifth-best at Cal Poly -- and broke a school record by scoring five times. Craig Young holds the school single-game rushing record with 283 yards against Saint Mary's in 1996, followed by Louis Jackson (267 vs. Portland State in 1978) and Paul Dickens (266 vs. Portland State in 1979). Noble became the 12th Mustang to surpass the 1,000-yard mark for the season, doing it in the 2005 Southern Utah game, and finished with a school-record 1,578 yards, averaging 7.1 yards per trip, and added 1,009 yards as a sophomore in 2006.

AT THE CONTROLS IN 2009: Mustang head coach Tim Walsh announced during the 2009 spring camp that junior **Tony Smith** has earned the No. 1 spot at quarterback and he has maintained that position through preseason camp. **Jonathan Dally** was Cal Poly's starting signal caller in 2007 and 2008. Matt Brennan started 15 of Cal Poly's previous 17 games since taking over as quarterback midway through the 2005 season when senior Anthony Garnett suffered a season-ending knee injury. Prior to that, Cal Poly had utilized a two- or three-quarterback system for a few seasons -- most notably Garnett, Cordel Webb and John Mende in 2004, Mende and Chris Peterson in 2003, Peterson and Kevin Cooper in 2002 and Peterson and Seth Burford in 2001, Rich Ellerson's first year as Mustang head coach.

NEW RULES FOR 2009: A kicker who carries the ball outside the tackle box before kicking the ball does not receive roughing-the-kicker protection. The face mask foul now includes the chin strap.

NATIONAL RANKINGS: As a team in 2008, Cal Poly was ranked No. 1 in scoring offense (44.4) and total offense (487.45), No. 2 in sacks (3.36), No. 3 in rushing offense (306.45), No. 4 in passing efficiency (167.72), No. 7 in both third-down conversions (48.2 percent) and fourth-down conversions (64.7 percent), No. 14 in turnover margin (+0.91), No. 17 in time of possession (32:17), No. 20 in red zone offense (84 percent), No. 27 in net punting (34.47) and No. 72 in passing offense (181.0). The Mustangs are No. 16 in rushing defense (102.45), No. 115 in passing defense (268.55), No. 81 in total defense (371.0), No. 70 in scoring defense (26.55) and No. 8 in sacks allowed (0.82). Individually, **Jonathan Dally** was No. 3 in passing efficiency (171.55) and No. 18 in total offense (252.82), **Ramses Barden** was No. 2 in receiving yards per game (114.27), No. 20 in receptions per game (6.09) and No. 8 in scoring (9.82), **Sean Lawyer** was No. 9 in sacks (.82), **Carlton Gillespie** was No. 18 in sacks (0.73) and **David Fullerton** was No. 47 in interceptions per game (0.36).

AGAINST THE FBS: In 2002 Cal Poly played two Football Bowl Subdivision (formerly Division I-A) opponents in one season for the first time in school history (Toledo and Kent State), and did it again in 2003 (UTEP and Akron) and 2006 (San Jose State and San Diego State). Cal Poly is 3-5 in its last eight games against FBS schools, defeating UTEP 34-13 in the 2003 opener and San Diego State 16-14 on Oct. 28, 2006 and 29-27 on Aug. 30, 2008. The Mustangs are 4-18 against FBS schools since 1980 and will play a pair of FBS teams this fall -- at Ohio on Sept. 19 and at San Jose State on Sept. 26.

CONFERENCE LEADERS: Mustang leaders in the Great West Conference in 2008 were quarterback Jonathan Dally in passing efficiency (171.6), wide receiver Ramses Barden in receiving yards per game (114.3) and scoring (9.8), David Fullerton in interceptions (.36 per game), Asa Jackson in forced fumbles (.27) and pass breakups (1.09), end Sean Lawyer in sacks (0.91) and Andrew Gardner in kick scoring (7.5). As a team, Cal Poly was No. 1 in scoring offense (44.4), turnover margin (0.91), rushing offense (306.5), total offense (487.5), passing efficiency (167.7), third-down conversions (48.1 percent), sacks (37) and sacks allowed (9).

OPPOSING MARKS: Cal Poly's 12 opponents last fall -- including McNeese State, a game canceled due to Hurricane Ike -- were 68-60 for the season with Montana at 14-2 leading the way and Weber State at 10-4. The Mustangs' 2007 foes posted a combined 52-70 record, with just two of 10 foes posting victories in the final week of the regular season (Western Oregon had a bye that week). Only Western Oregon (9-2), North Dakota State (10-1), Iona (7-4) and South Dakota State (7-4) had winning marks. Cal Poly's 2006 foes were 60-60 for the 2006 season with six posting winning records, led by Montana at 12-2 and North Dakota State at 10-1. Cal Poly's 2005 opponents were a combined 68-68 with seven schools enjoying winning seasons, led by Texas State (11-3). Mustang opponents finished a combined 56-55 in 2004 with one playoff participant (Eastern Washington 9-4) - - and six with winning marks.

A SACK JOB: Cal Poly's defense recorded a school-record 50 sacks in 11 games in 2004 and broke the mark again in 2005 with 62 sacks in 13 games. Meanwhile, the Mustang offense protected its quarterbacks well, surrendering just 11 sacks in 2004 and 15 in 2005. The 2006 squad allowed just 11 sacks and the 2007 team allowed only 15 sacks (27th in the nation) but notched just 21 on defense; the zero sacks at Texas State marked the first time in 43 games the Mustangs did not have a sack in a game. Last fall, the Mustang defense notched 37 sacks -- No. 2 in the nation -- while the offensive line allowed nine.

Mustang Notes

POSTSEASON AWARDS: Cal Poly senior wide receiver Ramses Barden and senior offensive lineman Stephen Field are the first football players to earn first-team All-Great West Conference honors four times. Barden won his second consecutive Offensive Player of the Year award while Field, an all-conference center the last three years, was named to the first team as a guard last fall. In addition, freshman cornerback Asa Jackson earned the conference's freshman player of the year award and then-head coach Rich Ellerson was named coach of the year for the third time. Including Barden, Field and Jackson, Cal Poly was represented by nine players on the all-conference first team -- four on offense and five on defense. Barden swept all first-team All-America honors awarded by the American Football Coaches Association, Walter Camp Football Foundation, Sports Network and Associated Press. In addition, Field was a second-team Sports Network All-American and quarterback Jonathan Dally and fullback Jon Hall were honorable mentions. Field was a first-team selection by Associated Press.

MILESTONES: Several Mustangs on the 2008 roster approached or surpassed career statistical milestones in the Cal Poly record book. Senior running back James Noble finished No. 3 in career rushing with 3,678 yards and fell 154 yards shy of No. 2 Antonio Warren. Noble also had 35 career rushing touchdowns, surpassing Louis Jackson for No. 1. Ramses Barden had 206 career receptions, surpassing school record-holder Darrell Jones. Barden also had 4,203 career receiving yards, surpassing Kamil Loud for No. 1 earlier in the season; Barden had 50 career TDs, moving to No. 1 on the list late last season. Senior linebacker Mark Restelli had 267 career tackles, No. 9 on the list and seven behind No. 8 Jonathan Trotter.

MUSTANGS BY THE DOTS: Tim Walsh, hired Jan. 9, 2009, is Cal Poly's 16th head football coach ... Cal Poly has scored in 71 of its last 75 quarters -- 30 of its last 31 quarters in 2007, including 22 straight until held scoreless in the fourth quarter by Southern Utah, and in 41 of 44 quarters last fall ... the 80,709 at Wisconsin is the largest crowd to see a Cal Poly football game; previous largest was 32,536 at Fresno State in 1985 ... against Weber State, Cal Poly trailed at halftime for the first time all season (28-21); Cal Poly and UC Davis were tied at 21-21 at the half ... the Mustangs beat Southern Utah for the eighth straight time and Idaho State for the fourth consecutive time ... the Cal Poly-UC Davis series is all even at 16-16-2 ... the Mustangs won seven straight games for the first time since 2004 when the team opened the season 7-0 before losing to UC Davis ... the 1973 Mustang squad won its first eight games ... Cal Poly's 10 sacks against South Dakota State in 2008 is a school Division I record (old mark of nine was set against Southern Utah in 2005) ... the Jackrabbits had won seven straight home games and were 50-16 under head coach John Stiegelmeier at home (17-4 at night) before the Mustangs posted a 42-28 win Oct. 18 in Brookings ... coupled with McNeese State's 46-44 triple-overtime win Oct. 4, it marked the first time in eight years that South Dakota State had lost back-to-back home games ... the cancellation of Cal Poly's game at McNeese State due to Hurricane Ike last September was its first postponement of a football game since Sept. 15, 2001, against Saint Mary's, due to the events of Sept. 11, 2001 ... that game was made up on Nov. 24 ... the safety recorded by Montana in 2008 was the first against Cal Poly in six years and the second in the Rich Ellerson Era ... Andrew Gardner's 21-yard field goal as time expired against San Diego State on Aug. 30, 2008, marked the third time Cal Poly had won a game on the final play since moving to the Football Championship Subdivision in 1994 ... the other two were in 1997 as Alan Beilke kicked a 34-yard field goal to beat New Mexico State 38-35 in overtime in Las Cruces and a 50-yarder to beat Montana State 20-19 in Bozeman ... strong safety David Fullerton intercepted a pass in four consecutive games, including the final three contests of the 2007 season, before Montana snapped the streak Sept. 6 ... the Mustangs were 5-2 at home in 2008, 4-1 in 2007, 6-0 at home in 2005, 4-1 in 2006 and had won 10 straight home games before falling to South Dakota State in 2006 ... overall, the Mustangs have won seven of nine, 15 of their last 20 games and 48 of 69 contests going back to the 2002 finale and have won 18 of their last 30 games on the road (3-1 in 2008) ... the win at Northwestern State on Sept. 20 was Ellerson's 50th at Cal Poly ... Ellerson had won his last five home openers prior to the loss to Montana on Sept. 6 and was 7-1 in regular-season finales ... the Mustangs have won 30 of their last 36 home contests (5-2 last year) ... the Mustangs have won seven or more games each of the last six seasons, the longest such streak in school history (old mark of four was set by the 1955-58 teams) ... over a stretch of its last seven games of the 2007 season and the 11 games of '08, Cal Poly averaged 24.6 first downs, 45.0 points and 504.7 total yards per contest, gaining 7.7 yards per play ... Ramses Barden's 10 catches and 268 receiving yards against Idaho State in 2007 were career highs; he caught 12 passes against Southern Utah on Oct. 25, 2008, for a new career high and caught nine passes in a game four times ... there have been 13 200-yard games by a receiver in Cal Poly football history and Barden has five of them ... Tre'dale Tolver's 40-yard punt return against Wisconsin was his second in two seasons; he returned one 89 yards against Texas State in 2007 ... the Mustangs, who had not given up a kickoff return for a TD since 2001, surrendered two in 2007 and the punt return for a TD by Idaho State in 2007 was the first since 2003 ... the 55-0 win over Savannah State three years ago was the sixth shutout in the Rich Ellerson era and marked the first time since the 1980 Division II national championship season that Cal Poly had posted three shutouts in a season ... the Mustangs have surpassed the 60-point barrier three times since moving to Division I in 1994 -- 69 in 2008 against Southern Utah, 64 against Sonoma State in 1994 and 63 against UC Davis in 2007 ... Cal Poly surpassed the 30-point mark nine times last fall, one more than the school mark of eight set by the 1995 squad (5-6) ... the Mustangs scored 30 or more points seven times in 2007, equalling the 1997 (10-1) and 2005 (9-4) teams ... Ellerson-coached Mustang teams were 6-0 after a bye week before falling to Montana in 2005 and South Dakota State in 2006; he finished 10-2 after a bye ... in the Ellerson Era, Cal Poly was 5-1 against Division II schools, losing only to Western Washington in 2001, his first season with the Mustangs ... Cal Poly has held four foes to minus rushing yardage since moving to the FCS in 1994 -- St. Mary's (-38) in 1994, Weber State (-2) in 2002, Humboldt State (-4) in 2003 and Idaho State (-6) on Sept. 11, 2004 ... the Mustangs were 9-0 when leading after three quarters in 2005 ... Cal Poly has recorded seven sacks in each of its last two games against Montana ... Cal Poly was 21-0 in the last 21 games in which the Mustangs led at halftime until South Dakota State rallied from a 14-3 halftime deficit for a 29-28 victory in 2006; Cal Poly squandered a 20-14 halftime deficit at Texas State in 2007, and let a 14-6 halftime edge against North Dakota State get away, also in 2007.

A SCORE FOR THE DEFENSE: Cal Poly's defense scored seven touchdowns in 2004, exceeding the four scores the Mustang defense recorded in 2003. Those 11 scores in 2003 and 2004 matched the total of 11 defensive TDs in Cal Poly's first nine seasons at the NCAA FCS level. Cal Poly has won 21 of its last 26 games when its defense or special teams scores a TD, dating back to the 2002 season. The losses were to Idaho State in 2003, UC Davis in 2005, Texas State and North Dakota State in 2007 and Wisconsin in 2008. The 2005 Mustang defense scored three times -- Courtney Brown's 28-yard interception return against Montana State, Chris Gocong's fumble recovery in the endzone against Montana State and Kenny Chicoine's 59-yard interception return at UC Davis. Mark Restelli's game-clinching 42-yard interception return for a score against Weber State was the first defensive TD in 2006 and the other was Kenny Chicoine's lateral of an interception to Kyle Shotwell covering 73 yards against Savannah State. The 2007 Mustang defense scored three touchdowns -- a 75-yard fumble recovery and run by nose tackle Justin Reece against Southern Utah and David Fullerton's interceptions against North Dakota State and Iona. Last year, Fullerton stepped in front of a Southern Utah pitch and scampered 90 yards for a TD on Oct. 25; he also returned an interception 38 yards for a score against UC Davis.

TEAM THEFTS: Cal Poly's 25 interceptions in 11 games in 2004 were a school Division I-AA record (12 seasons) and two short of the overall mark. The 2001 and 1995 Mustangs both intercepted 20 passes. The season-by-season totals (FCS only):

MUSTANGS RANKED: Cal Poly, ranked as high as No. 3 in 2005, settled for a No. 6 final ranking by both ESPN/USA Today and The Sports Network. The Mustangs were ranked as high as No. 5 in 2004 and finished 15th in one poll (TSN) and 17th in the other (ESPN/USA Today). The Mustangs opened the 2006 campaign ranked sixth by The Sports Network and were in the top 10 throughout the year before losing to Montana and North Dakota State. The 2007 squad finished No. 24 in The Sports Network poll and the 2008 Mustangs ended up No. 8 in the FCS Coaches Poll and No. 10 in The Sports Network media poll.

IN THE PROS: Cal Poly had three former players active in the National Football League during the exhibition season: defensive end Chris Gocong with the Philadelphia Eagles, cornerback Courtney Brown with the Dallas Cowboys and wide receiver Ramses Barden with the New York Giants. Gocong was a third-round draft choice in 2006, Brown was chosen in the seventh round in 2007 and Barden was selected in the third round in 2009. Linebackers Jordan Beck and Kyle Shotwell played in exhibition games a year ago, but were released on Aug. 30, 2008. Brown was released by the Cowboys on Sept. 5, 2009.

ZEROES ON THE BOARD: Cal Poly has scored in 113 consecutive games. Last time the Mustangs were shut out was in 1998 by Nevada, 63-0, in Reno. The Mustangs also were shut out by Northern Arizona in 1998, 9-0. Cal Poly's two shutouts to start the 2006 season were its first since a 31-0 shutout over Northern Colorado on Nov. 13, 2004. Rich Ellerson earned six shutouts in eight seasons as head coach at Cal Poly.

0-0 at Cal Poly (First Season) • 117-82 Overall (19th Season)

Tim Walsh, offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the United States Military Academy the last two seasons, was named Cal Poly's 16th head football coach at a press conference held Jan. 9, 2009.

"Tim Walsh brings all of the qualities we were looking for in a head coach for our football team," Cal Poly director of athletics Alison Cone said. "He has been a successful head coach at two universities in California.

"He is a quality leader who understands the unique culture at Cal Poly," Cone added. "He knows how to help young men reach their potential in the classroom, as citizens, and on the football field. We had several outstanding applicants from which to choose, but I am thrilled we were able to hire a person with such outstanding credentials to direct our program.

"He has the ability to continue the success the Cal Poly football program has enjoyed the last six years and that the community and the university will be proud of and excited to support," Cone said.

Walsh replaces Rich Ellerson, the Mustangs' head football coach for the last eight seasons. Ellerson was named head coach at Army on Dec. 26, 2008.

"We had several outstanding applicants from which to choose, but I am thrilled we were able to hire a person with such outstanding credentials to direct this program," Cone said of Walsh. "He is a high-character, high-quality individual who will bring great passion and enthusiasm to our campus."

Walsh has compiled a 117-82 record in 18 seasons as a college head coach, including four years at Sonoma State (27-14 from 1989-92) and 14 more seasons at Portland State (90-68 from 1993-2006). He guided Sonoma State to the Northern California Athletic Conference title in 1991 (ending UC Davis' streak of 20 consecutive conference titles), a pair of NCAA Division II playoff berths while at Sonoma State and four more postseason berths while at Portland State.

"I have a tremendous working knowledge of Cal Poly, its history and current status," said Walsh. "The combination of a tremendous academic university, a tremendous area to recruit and live, and a football program that's winning all added up to a great opportunity for me.

"My goals are to continue to recruit student-athletes whose goals are to be the best they can be, both in the class and on the field, and become quality young men," Walsh added. "If we do that, winning won't be a problem. This is an opportunity to build a great program and develop a great relationship between the campus and the community at large."

A charismatic speaker and motivator, Walsh guided Sonoma State to three winning seasons in four years at the helm of the Seawolves and 10 more above-.500 campaigns in his 14-year term at Portland State. With the Vikings, Walsh coached 14 All-Americans and 11 Academic All-Americans.

Portland State joined the Big Sky Conference in 1996. During Walsh's 11 seasons when the Vikings were in the Big Sky, he coached players who earned 39 first-team All-Big Sky honors, 51 on the second team, 80 honorable mentions, 58 Academic All-Big Sky honorees, 59 Big Sky Players of the Week, 20 national player of the week honorees, five Walter Payton Award finalists and one Buck Buchanan Award finalist.

A Serra High School (San Mateo, Calif.) graduate, Walsh played football at UC Riverside in the mid-1970s and earned a bachelor's degree in history in 1977.

He began his coaching career at his high school alma mater, Serra, spending four years (1977-80) as an assistant coach before becoming head coach (1981-85) at Moreau Catholic High School in Hayward. Walsh moved into the college coaching ranks in 1986, becoming an assistant coach and defensive coordinator at Santa Clara for one season.

In 1987 and 1988, Walsh was offensive coordinator at Sonoma State before becoming head coach of the Seawolves (then the Cossacks) in 1989. His first season in Rohnert Park produced a 4-6 mark, but Walsh guided Sonoma State to 7-3, 9-2 and 7-3 records in his final three years there.

Walsh embarked upon a 14-year head coaching career at Portland State in 1993, guiding the Vikings to NCAA Division II playoff berths each of his first three seasons.

Portland State elevated its athletics program to Division I in 1996 and, though the Vikings struggled in the first three years at that level, there was steady progression -- from 3-8 to 4-7 and 5-6. The 1999 Viking team began a string of seven winning campaigns in eight seasons, including a Football Championship Subdivision (formerly Division I-AA) playoff berth in 2000.

Walsh piloted Portland State to a quartet of second-place finishes in the Big Sky along with a third and three fourth-place finishes. In 14 seasons at the helm, Walsh's Vikings were 62-21 at home. He earned two wins against FBS schools -- Hawaii in 2001 and New Mexico in 2006 -- and was 3-0 against Cal Poly while at Portland State along with a 2-1 mark against the Mustangs while at Sonoma State.

Walsh was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award (FCS Coach of the Year) in 1999

In 2008, Walsh's second season at Army, the Black Knights finished ninth in the Football Bowl Subdivision in rushing offense (241.42 yards per game), fourth in sacks allowed (1.00) and 15th in time of possession (31:45).

While at Army, Walsh's recruiting responsibilities included nine Western states.

The list of coaches who were assistants under Walsh includes Dan Hawkins (Colorado), Gary Patterson (Texas Christian) and Chris Peterson (Boise State). National Football League players who competed under Walsh's tutelage include -- from Sonoma State -- offensive lineman Larry Allen (Dallas) -- and from Portland State -- tight end Tony Curtis (Dallas), wide receiver Shaun Bodiford (Green Bay), linebacker Jordan Senn (Indianapolis) and linebacker Adam Hayward (Tampa Bay).

Walsh and his wife, Jody, have four children: Luke, Casey, Sean and Megan.

SAN DIEGO, Calif. – Junior placekicker Andrew Gardner booted a 21-yard field goal as time expired to lift Cal Poly to a 29-27 victory over San Diego State in the season opener.

The Aztecs had taken a 27-26 lead, their first advantage of the game, with 6:51 to play as sophomore running back Brandon Sullivan ran five yards for the score. A pass attempt for a two-point conversion fell incomplete, leaving San Diego State with a one-point lead.

The visiting Mustangs, ranked No. 14 in the preseason Sports Network media and FCS coaches polls, turned the ball over on downs with 4:24 to play, but held San Diego State on its next possession, getting the ball back with 3:39 to go.

Cal Poly drove from its own 33-yard line to the Aztec 4. Completions to Ramses Barden spanning 13 and 10 yards plus a 29-yard run by senior slotback James Noble set up the winning field goal by Gardner.

Cal Poly took advantage of four San Diego State turnovers in the first half alone for a 16-7 advantage at the break.

Cal Poly enjoyed a 483-379 advantage in total offense but trailed in first downs, 23-21. The Mustangs also compiled a 16-minute advantage in time of possession.

Noble finished with 89 yards on 11 carries while Ryan Mole added 84 yards on 12 trips. Quarterback Jonathan Dally completed 12 of 21 passes for 220 yards, with Barden catching seven passes for 161 yards.

Mustang linebacker Fred Hives II notched 10 tackles while fellow linebacker Marty Mohamed recorded eight. Nose tackle James Chen, who missed most of the 2007 season after injuring a knee in the opener, finished with a fumble recovery, a forced fumble, a sack and assisted on the safety.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif. – Senior quarterback Cole Bergquist threw two touchdown passes and ran for another score as No. 5 Montana rallied from a 21-14 halftime deficit to beat No. 11 Cal Poly in a non-conference game.

Junior placekicker Andrew Gardner, who kicked a 21-yard field goal as time expired to give Cal Poly the 29-27 win over San Diego State on Aug. 30, missed a 27-yarder with 38 seconds remaining that would have given the Mustangs the lead against Montana.

Bergquist hit Mike Ferriter with 34- and 20-yard touchdown passes for the Grizzlies, the latter tying the game at 21-21 with 9:10 to play in the third quarter.

Montana added a safety with 13:57 to play when Cal Poly senior quarterback Jonathan Dally fumbled the ball into the end zone.

Less than three minutes later, Montana extended its lead to 30-21 on a four-yard run by Andrew Schmidt, who finished the game with 145 yards on 26 carries.

Cal Poly responded with a two-yard touchdown run by senior slotback James Noble with 8:21 to play, capping a 73-yard drive. Gardner's extra-point kick made the score 30-28.

Senior defensive end Sean Lawyer sacked Bergquist for a six-yard loss on fourth down and the Mustangs drove from their own 44 to the Montana 10. But Gardner's potential game-winning 27-yard kick sailed wide to the left and Bergquist ran out the remaining 38 seconds with a kneel down.

Dally rushed for 80 yards on 16 carries and completed 16 of 23 passes for 248 yards and a pair of touchdowns for Cal Poly.

Walter Payton Award watch list member Ramses Barden, a senior wide receiver, caught seven passes for the second straight week, notching 131 yards and two scores. He raised his career receiving yards total to 3,238 yards, a school record. Kamil Loud had 3,144 yards from 1995-97.

Lawyer and linebacker Fred Hives II each recorded 11 tackles for Cal Poly. Lawyer also notched 2.5 sacks.

NATCHITOCHEs, La. – Senior quarterback Jonathan Dally threw two touchdown passes and ran for two more as No. 11/13 Cal Poly jumped to a 28-7 lead in the first 25 minutes and coasted to a 52-18 victory over Northwestern State in a non-conference game, Cal Poly's first-ever in the state of Louisiana.

In the first meeting ever between the two schools, Cal Poly amassed 470 yards in total offense and senior wide receiver Ramses Barden caught a season-high nine balls for 176 yards and one score.

Dally ran two yards for the first score of the game and tossed a four-yard touchdown pass to Barden to cap a 94-yard drive late in the first quarter as Cal Poly jumped to a 14-0 lead in the first four minutes.

The Mustangs added two more touchdowns in the second period on a 45-yard pass from Dally to Tre'dale Tolver and a 33-yard run by senior slotback James Noble.

Noble now has 16 career 100-yard games rushing, two shy of the school record, and 29 career touchdowns by rushing, tied for No. 3 all-time at Cal Poly and three short of the Cal Poly mark. He finished with 118 yards on just eight carries Saturday.

In the second half, Cal Poly scored on a four-yard run by Ryan Mole – he finished with 51 yards on eight carries – a one-yard run by Dally and a seven-yard run by junior slotback Jono Grayson.

Andrew Gardner was perfect on seven PAT kicks and added a 22-yard field goal in the third quarter.

Dally completed 11 of 17 passes for 224 yards.

Defensive leaders for Cal Poly were Gavin Cooper with seven tackles, including two sacks, and linebacker Fred Hives with six tackles. Defensive end Carlton Gillespie also had two sacks while Kevin Hess blocked a Northwestern State punt.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif. – Senior wide receiver Ramses Barden caught three touchdown passes and senior slotback James Noble ran for two more scores as No. 8 Cal Poly defeated South Dakota 49-22 in a Great West Conference football game.

Barden caught five passes for 158 yards while Noble rushed for 109 yards on just 10 carries for Cal Poly (3-1). South Dakota, which lost despite accumulating 447 yards in total offense, fell to 2-4. The Coyotes are in their first year of transition to Division I.

Cal Poly jumped to a 21-0 lead in the first 11 minutes of the game and never looked back. Barden caught scoring passes of 34 and 10 yards from senior quarterback Jonathan Dally, sandwiched around a 34-yard touchdown run by Noble for the quick 21-0 lead with 4:24 left in the opening period.

Barden caught a 16-yard touchdown pass from Dally with a minute to go before halftime as Cal Poly went into the locker room with a 28-7 advantage.

In the third period, Noble and Dally each ran one yard for a Mustang touchdown and a 42-7 cushion. Junior fullback Jon Hall notched the final Cal Poly score, a 47-yard run down the right side-line with 9:33 to play.

South Dakota junior quarterback Noah Shepard scored all of his team's touchdowns on runs of 1, 1 and 2 yards. He finished with 92 yards on 12 rushes and completed 18 of 34 passes for 211 yards.

Dally, who completed six of 10 passes for 162 yards, now has 37 career touchdown passes, tying Seth Burford for No. 2 on the Cal Poly list. Record-holder Mike Fisher has 62.

Cal Poly's defensive leaders were senior linebacker Fred Hives with 14 tackles, freshman free safety Greg Francis with four pass breakups and eight tackles and freshman linebacker Quentin Greenlaw with seven tackles. Junior strong safety David Fullerton added his second interception of the season.

Freshman safety Greg Francis notched his first two collegiate interceptions to thwart other South Dakota State rallies. Ian Masterson blocked a Jackrabbit punt to set up Cal Poly's final score.

Junior slotback Jono Grayson scored two touchdowns and rushed for 124 yards – three shy of his career high -- while senior quarterback Jonathan Dally ran for one score and passed for another despite throwing his first interception of the season.

Dally completed 11 of 18 passes for 132 yards, including a 34-yard scoring pass to senior wide receiver Ramses Barden.

Dally ran one yard for another Mustang score while Grayson notched touchdown runs of two and 81 yards.

Senior slotback Ryan Mole gained 81 yards on 10 carries, scoring Cal Poly's final touchdown on a one-yard run with seven minutes to play.

Junior wide receiver Tre'dale Tolver caught a career-high seven passes for 59 yards. Barden was held to two catches for 40 yards, both receptions in the second half.

The Mustangs, fifth in the nation in total offense entering Saturday's contest, outgained South Dakota State 419-290 in total yards, including 287 yards on the ground. The Jackrabbits were held to just 38 rushing yards, one year after Cory Koenig rushed for 259 yards and four touchdowns in a 48-35 win over the Mustangs.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif. – Senior wide receiver Ramses Barden broke one of Jerry Rice's NCAA records, established another Cal Poly mark and senior quarterback Jonathan Dally equaled his career and school-record high with six touchdown passes as No. 3/6 Cal Poly rolled past Southern Utah for its fourth consecutive victory.

Barden caught a touchdown pass in a Mustang game for the 27th time, breaking Rice's NCAA Football Championship Subdivision record of 26 set while he played at Mississippi Valley State from 1981-84. With his 12 catches for 217 yards, Barden also surpassed Cal Poly's record for career receptions.

Dally completed 22 of 26 passes for 410 yards and six touchdowns, equaling the mark he set against Weber State a year ago.

Cal Poly amassed 33 first downs and 600 yards in total offense, averaging a school-record 10.7 yards per play. Southern Utah lost despite accumulating 30 first downs and 538 total yards.

The Mustangs' 69 points and 10 touchdowns are new school records since moving to Division I in 1994.

Cal Poly never trailed, but couldn't shake the Thunderbirds until the second half. The two teams combined for over 700 yards of total offense in the first half and the Mustangs held a 35-34 edge at the break. But Cal Poly scored the first 34 points of the second half to pull away, earning its eighth straight win over the Thunderbirds.

Senior slotback Ryan Mole scored three of Cal Poly's touchdowns, two on runs of 17 and two yards and the other on a 28-yard pass from Dally. It marked the first time that Mole had scored more than one touchdown in the game as a Mustang; he finished with 77 yards on 11 carries and the one catch.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif. – Senior slotback Ryan Mole rushed for three touchdowns and senior slotback James Noble tied a school record with his 32nd career touchdown run as No. 3/4 Cal Poly defeated Idaho State in a non-conference game played in a steady light rain in the first three quarters.

Mole finished with 140 yards on just eight carries, scoring on runs of 4, 8 and 71 yards, as the Mustangs earned their fifth straight victory. Idaho State (0-9) surrendered 459 rushing yards, a Cal Poly FCS record.

In addition to Mole, sophomore fullback Jordan Yocum also cracked the 100-yard mark rushing, gaining a career-high 116 yards on eight carries and scoring twice on runs of 39 and 42 yards.

Noble, who missed the last two games with a fractured hand, netted 45 yards on six carries and scored the first touchdown of the game on a 15-yard run, his 32nd as a Mustang. Louis Jackson also had 32 from 1977-80.

Junior fullback Jon Hall netted 84 yards on nine trips.

Senior wide receiver Ramses Barden caught a touchdown pass for the 16th consecutive game, adding to his school record and moving to within one of Jerry Rice's NCAA FCS mark of 17 set while he played at Mississippi Valley State from 1981-84.

Senior quarterback Jonathan Dally completed five of 12 passes for 88 yards and the one score to Barden, who finished with four catches for 77 yards. A year ago Dally passed for 453 yards in the Mustangs' 48-28 win in Pocatello.

Cal Poly accumulated 557 yards in total offense while Idaho State gained 56 rushing yards and 222 passing yards for 278 total yards.

Cal Poly's defensive leaders were free safety Greg Francis and linebacker Fred Hives, each with seven tackles. Linebacker Mark Restelli added three tackles, two pass breakups and recovered an Idaho State fumble.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif. – Seniors James Noble and Jonathan Dally each ran for two touchdowns and 10 backs gained 386 yards on the ground as No. 3 Cal Poly defeated North Carolina Central 49-3 in a non-conference game.

Noble broke a school record and senior wide receiver Ramses Barden tied another NCAA FCS mark as the Mustangs earned their sixth straight victory and improved to 7-1 on the season. North Carolina Central, held to eight first downs and 123 yards in total offense, fell to 2-7.

Noble ran four and three yards for his touchdowns, giving him 34 career rushing touchdowns, a Cal Poly record. Old mark of 32 was set by Louis Jackson from 1976-80. Noble finished with 64 yards on just five carries.

Dally added scoring runs of 21 and four yards and completed six of nine passes for 101 yards and two more touchdowns while playing just the first half.

Dally connected with Barden on a four-yard scoring pass less than three minutes into the game and also hit Barden with a 26-yarder later in the first period. Barden finished with three catches for 36 yards.

Barden has caught at least one touchdown pass in 17 consecutive games, tying Jerry Rice's NCAA FCS mark set while he was at Mississippi Valley State from 1981-84. Two weeks ago he caught a touchdown in a game for the 27th time in his career, breaking another Rice record in NCAA FCS.

Cal Poly led 42-0 at halftime and neither team scored again until the final six minutes of the game.

North Carolina Central avoided a shutout with a 39-yard field goal by Brandon Gilbert with 5:28 to play and Cal Poly scored its final touchdown on a 25-yard run by backup quarterback Tony Smith with 46 seconds to go.

Cal Poly accumulated 508 yards in total offense and 26 first downs.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif. – Senior quarterback Jonathan Dally rushed for 173 yards and one touchdown and passed for two more scores as No. 3 Cal Poly defeated rival UC Davis, won the Golden Horseshoe Classic for the third straight year and captured its third Great West Conference championship in the last five years.

Cal Poly (8-1) evened the series record against the Aggies (5-6) at 16-16-2 and finished Great West play with a 3-0 mark.

Dally, one of 17 Mustang seniors honored in a pregame ceremony, carried the ball 22 times for his career-high rushing total, eclipsing the 153 yards he earned against South Dakota State a year ago. He also completed eight of 20 passes for 95 yards.

Dally scored on a 14-yard run midway through the first quarter and hit senior wide receiver Ramses Barden on a pair of touchdown passes spanning three and two yards.

For Barden, it was the 18th consecutive game that he has caught a touchdown pass, surpassing Jerry Rice in the NCAA Football Championship Subdivision record book.

Last month Barden broke another Rice record for career games with a touchdown catch. Barden's mark now stands at 30 games.

Cal Poly, which has scored 42 or more points in seven straight games, amassed 522 yards in total offense against UC Davis, including 427 yards on the ground. The Aggies entered the game fifth in the FCS in rushing defense, giving up just 74.9 yards a contest.

UC Davis garnered 366 yards in total offense, 332 of them through the air as sophomore quarterback Greg Denham completed 22 of 42 passes, four of them for touchdowns.

Jordan Yocum ran six yards for a 41-21 Cal Poly lead with 5:48 to go in the third quarter. He finished with his second 100-yard game of the season, netting 110 yards on 10 carries. Ryan Mole added 78 yards on nine trips.

MADISON, WI -- John Clay's second touchdown run of the game, a six-yarder, and Philip Welch's extra-point kick lifted Wisconsin of the Big Ten Conference to a 36-35 overtime victory over No. 3 (FCS) Cal Poly in a non-conference game.

Jonathan Dally and Ryan Mole each ran two yards for touchdowns and Tre'dale Tolver returned a punt 40 yards for a score in the first half as the Mustangs built a 20-7 lead, but Wisconsin rallied to snap the Mustangs' seven-game winning streak and improve to 7-5 on the season.

Cal Poly was on offense first in the extra period and on the first play Dally found Walter Payton Award candidate Ramses Barden in the right corner of the end zone for a 25-yard scoring pass. Andrew Gardner missed the extra point for the third time in the game.

That set the stage for Clay's game-tying touchdown and Welch's game-winning kick. Temperature at kickoff was 32 degrees with a 10-mph wind out of the south and a wind chill of 24 degrees.

Cal Poly jumped to a 13-0 lead in the opening 21 minutes of the game, led 20-14 at halftime and was ahead 29-21 on James Noble's 2-yard run with 8:12 to play. But Wisconsin forced OT on P.J. Hill's three-yard run with 1:42 to play, ending an 89-yard, nine-play drive.

Dally rushed for 118 yards – his sixth career 100-yard game as a Mustang – on 23 carries and completed eight of 16 passes for 95 yards and one score. Barden caught six passes for 83 yards, giving him exactly 200 career catches as a Mustang.

Cal Poly had possession of the ball for 40 minutes and produced more first downs, 23-17, but lost the battle in total yards, 429-371.

In suffering their first loss on the road this season, the Mustangs played before the largest crowd to see a Cal Poly football game. The 80,709 fans at Camp Randall Stadium far exceeded the previous largest crowd of 32,536 on Sept. 28, 1985, at Bulldog Stadium where Cal Poly fell 59-10 to Fresno State.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif. – Quarterback Cameron Higgins passed for 399 yards and two touchdowns and running back Trevyn Smith rushed for 137 yards and two more scores as No. 12 Weber State defeated No. 3 Cal Poly 49-35 in the opening round of the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision playoffs.

Higgins completed 21 of 33 passes, including scoring strikes of 37 yards to Smith and 15 yards to Cody Nakamura, as the Wildcats improved to 10-3 on the year and set up a rematch with Big Sky Conference rival Montana next Saturday in Missoula, Mont.

But Weber State answered with 1- and 29-yard scoring runs by Smith to take a 14-7 lead late in the first period.

Cal Poly tied the game twice in the second quarter, but the Wildcats established control of the game with back-to-back touchdowns late in the second quarter and early in the third period for a 35-21 advantage. Cal Poly scored twice in the final quarter, but Weber State answered each time.

Tim Toone caught 10 passes for 199 yards and Nakamura added four receptions for 34 yards for Weber State.

Cal Poly's Dally rushed for a career-high 177 yards on 23 carries and completed 11 of 30 passes for 185 yards. Dally, who entered the game with just one interception thrown all season, was intercepted four times by the Wildcats, including two by Scotty Goodloe.
